ENGAGEMENT PROCESS GOALS

- Listen to the community's perspective
- Understand the park's importance within the local context, especially its strong ties to the community
- Develop an inspiring vision for the future Lou Huff Park in partnership with the community
- Create a draft master plan for further community input based on community recommendations
- Complete the master plan design and offer suggestions/tactics for its implementation



PROJECT OVERVIEW

Current State of the Site:

- The park is named after the prominent, cherished and respected Garland resident Lula "Lou" Huff.
- Lou Huff Park is set for a \$4.4 million renovation.
- The revitalization of the park will be an important source of connection for the community.
- The park is adjacent to Garland Power and Light Operations located northeast of the site.
- The existing recreation center/pavilion was closed in 2002 and is currently used for storage.
- The current rec center cannot be repurposed due to structural issues.
- The community residents utilize the next nearest recreation center at Gale A. Fields in Embree Park.
- The 5,800 square foot playground was replaced in 2021.
- The onsite softball field is maintained by the City of Garland and is available for rental.
- There is an active project in the Engineering Department to stabilize a portion of the site-adjacent creek channel.



PROJECT SCOPE

- Multigenerational gathering place
- Overall site safety
- Local Park Local Focus
- Welcoming A gateway of sorts (comfortable, a place for longer use)
- Connect to adjacent neighborhood (Rainbow Estates) easy access
- Creative landscaping
- Versatile programmable space to include passive and active spaces
- Historical ties to Lou Huff and the community
- Reimagine the sports fields and sports courts
- Incorporate a memorial and public art (storytelling)
- Investigate other enhancements to tie the park to other community benefits
- Reuse of materials where possible



CITIZEN ADVISORY GROUP ACTIVITIES

- Two meetings took place on February 28, 2023, and April 4, 2023.
- The Citizen Advisory Group was comprised of members from various organizations:
 - Rainbow Estates Neighborhood Association
 - Garland NAACP
 - Carver Alumni Programs and Services Inc. (CAPS)
 - Former residents, clergy members, community volunteers
 - Individuals who have previously frequented the park
- The objective was to grasp the significance and relevance of Lou Huff within the community, prompting community stakeholders to share their personal stories.

- The community developed some key phrases that centered on creating an inviting and welcoming place for the community:

 - "Cultivating ourselves"
 - "Cultural district affects the lives of the young and old"
 - "Gathering & growth because it was the only one"
 - "Experiences that empower wisdom"





CITIZEN ADVISORY GROUP ACTIVITIES

- The design team conducted an exercise with the CAG to develop an inspiring logo and tagline for the proposed revitalization of the park.
- Based on the feedback received, the proposed logo and tagline were developed, integrating the suggestions provided by stakeholders, which included:
 - Building on the legacy of community
 - Community and culture bridging to the future
 - Bridging community and culture to reimagine the future
 - Celebrating a legacy of community
 - A legacy of community and culture
 - Celebrating legacy, creating community
 - Bridging generations and culture
 - Celebrating legacy, bridging community & culture



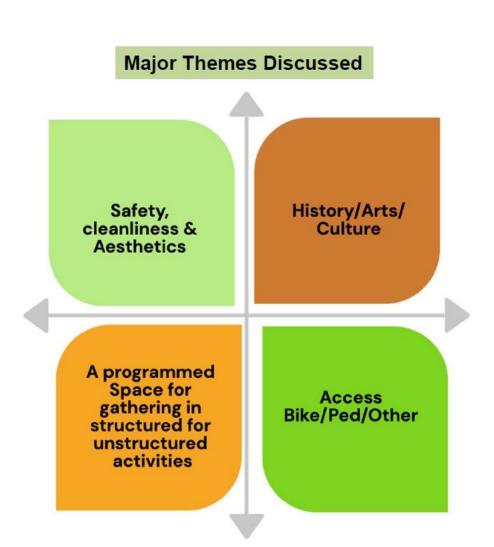


PUBLIC MEETINGS / TOWN HALLS

- The City of Garland PARD held two public meeting opportunities for the community to provide input on Lou Huff Park
 - Meeting #1 –Thursday, May 18 at the Fields Recreation Center @ 6 PM
 - Meeting #2 –Thursday, June 1 at Sims Chapel Church @ 6 PM









PROJECT SURVEY

- The design team developed a survey to gain a deeper understanding of the desires for the project
- Leading up to the public meetings, an array of notices and surveys were distributed:
 - 400 Flyers with QR codes were distributed at every public-facing facility (City Hall, libraries, rec centers, etc.)
 - 163 doorhangers
 - Ads on the City website
 - Garland City Press Magazine.
 - Social media promotion (Facebook & Nextdoor)
- Surveys were provided in both English & Spanish
- 43 completed surveys received by stakeholders, all involved in the early stages of the process
- Around 40 people participated in the "Huff Buck" voting exercise





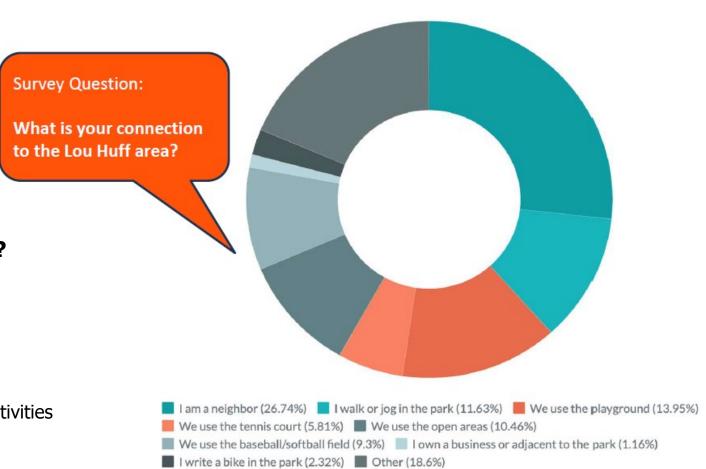
PROJECT SURVEY

- A place for people to go hang out and do illegal activities





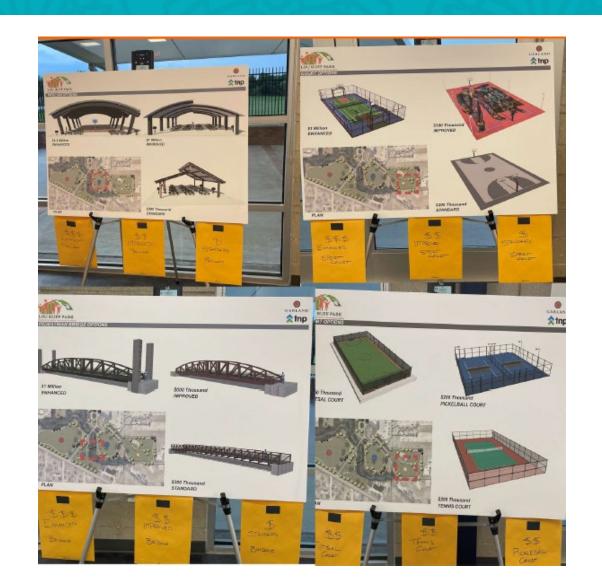

PUBLIC MEETINGS / TOWN HALLS

- The voting exercise included boards presenting various park program elements and their different implementation levels, each associated with relative costs.
- The program elements included a pedestrian bridge, walking trails, pavilion, and sports courts.
- To encourage public participation, community members were allocated a budget of three million dollars, referred to as "Huff Bucks," to distribute among these elements.
- Each person received one \$1M bill, two \$500K bills, and ten \$100K bills, which was intentionally insufficient to cover all elements, thus prompting participants to prioritize their spending.
- The outcome revealed the community's priorities and the value assigned to each park program element.

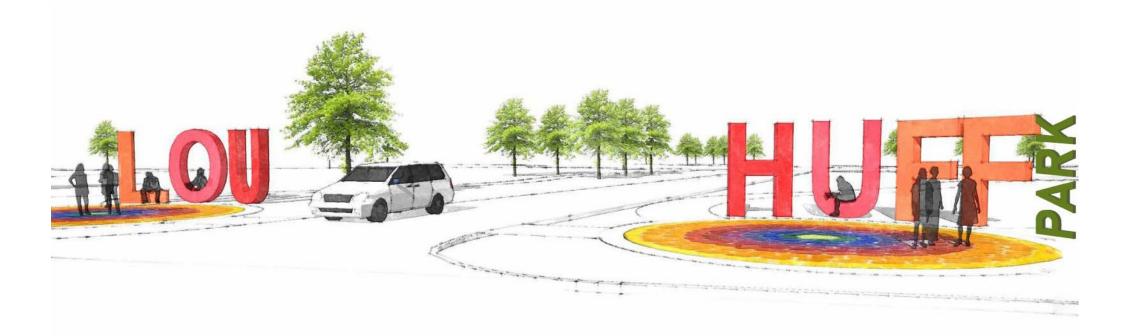
